Strategies in the Classroom: Prevention: If you Expect it, Pre-correct it!

As the saying goes, "If you can predict it, you can prevent it." At Pershing, we focus on prevention in the following ways:

- 1. Clear expectations
- 2. Predictable routines and procedures
- 3. Active supervision
- 4. Intentional student engagement
- 5. Thoughtful room arrangement

These practices can be applied outside school, too. For example, if your child struggles with leaving on time, having a set routine could help with this. It might sound like, "Remember where we agreed your device will go? I look forward to you putting it there and having time for us to talk with each other on the way." Then, immediately watch for the agreed upon behavior and let them know you appreciate it. Let us know if you have tried any of these ways of prevention outside of school.

ARRIVAL DROP OFF:

- To ensure a smooth and safe drop off for all students, please make sure you are following our traffic plan as outlined below. If you prefer to walk your child to school, wait to watch them walk in the building, or anything that requires stopping time please find designated parking around the building and walk with your child to school or pull into the cut-out and park your car there. Please do not stop and park your car in the drop off lane that runs west on Judson.
- We are trying to decrease as much congestion as possible at arrival, following the traffic plan will make drop off efficient and safe so that we do not back traffic up too much along Judson. Please pay extra close attention to students and families walking to and from school. We appreciate your patience during this time.

OUTDOOR RECESS:

We recognize the need for students to play outside and therefore, every attempt will be make to use the playground when possible. There is not a district-wide temperature that requires schools to have indoor recess. Every playground has unique characteristics and locations that may protect or expose students to the elements. At the building we will make the determination of indoor/outdoor recess based on the temperature, wind chill, precipitation, progress of snow and ice removal of the grounds.

Students are encouraged to dress appropriately for the weather. During wet, snowy weather, students not adequately dressed for the conditions will be asked to remain on the concrete play area for recess..

If students are not well enough to play outside, they are usually not well enough to be in school. Unless a physician's excuse has been obtained, a note from the parent/guardian is required each day that a students is to remain indoors during recess. The note should state the reason for the request.

Reading at Home: Reading Fluency

Fluency Activities

Everyday Fluency

- Read to your child! When you read aloud with your child, you are giving him/her a model of what fluent reading sounds like. No matter his/her age, it is important for your child to hear fluent reading.
- ☐ Find opportunities for your child to listen and follow along with audio recordings. Websites such as Storyline Online (https://www.storylineonline.net) have a variety of recorded stories. Visit your local library to check out the book versions so your child can read along.
- □ Practice echo reading with your child. Use a less familiar story or text and read small chunks of words, using your finger to track what you are reading. After you finish, let your child echo what you just read, tracking the words. Encourage your child to use the exact same speed and voice tone you used. This is a great activity to use with poetry!
- Reread the same story many times. Repeated reading of a story helps your child to become familiar with the words and sound they make when they are read fluently. You can also encourage your child to reread the same story multiple times, using a timer to see how quickly (and accurately!) your child reads each time he/she goes through the text.
- Encourage your child to read independently!
 Make sure he/she is reading books that are on his/her independent reading level and encourage 20 minutes of reading a night.

Finding "Just Right" Books

Children should be able to read at least 95% of the words in a text correctly. If they can't, the text is too hard for them to read independently. A quick way to check is have your child open the book to the first page and read aloud. If they struggle with five or more words on the first page of the book, it is too difficult.

Instead, you can read that book to them until it is in their independent reading range!
